





ROAMS GLOBAL STUDIES (20 Credits)

River, Ocean, and Mountain School (ROAMS) Global Studies

The intended purpose of ROAMS Global Studies is for academic exploration and engagement in cross-cultural diversity as students examine and compare global issues from a multi-disciplinary approach. The program will incorporate field studies and outdoor activities which will occur away from the school. These activities will include skiing/snowboarding, rafting, kayaking, surfing and climbing.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

ROAMS Global Studies will be comprised of 24 students (12 local domestic and 12 international) who compare social or cultural changes, population and health concerns, social movements, international development opportunities, geography, and human impacts on agriculture and water sustainability. Credit courses would be comprised of Environmental Science 11, Social Studies 10/11, Physical Education 10/11, Adventure Education 11/12, and Leadership 10/11/12. Students will also acquire certification for Occupational First Aid and Foodsafe.

The goal of incorporating adventure education elements into the program is two-fold. First, it builds a meaningful health and wellness component into everyday studies, and second integrates field studies for Environmental Science 11 and discussions around sustainability and global stewardship. Social Studies 10/11 will also be taught during field studies and classroom in conjunction with shared knowledge from Coast Salish and Nuu-Chah-Nulth nations to meet targets for reconciliation as well as graduation.

WHO SHOULD APPLY?

The program seeks to attract students in Grades 10-12 with a passion for the outdoors, a strong work ethic, dedication, social responsibility, global interest and a desire to experience the adventure tourism industry.
